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


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
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


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
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
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
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
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
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
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## **Beyond Tranquebar**

This volume is a collection of essays on the Danish colony of Tranquebar, known today by the name of Tharagampadi. The essays draw from ethnographic, archival and literary research in this fishing village on the Coromandel Coast. The contributors include leading scholars in their respective

fields from Denmark, USA and India. The essays are theoretically sophisticated and cover a broad range of subjects ranging from art, family, colonialism, religion, and print culture to education and material culture. This volume represents a significant intervention in the study of early colonialism in India as it also addresses the complexities of a post colony and how it is perceived in Denmark.



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## Borderland Lives in Northern South Asia

This volume provides valuable new ethnographic insights into life along some of the most contentious borders in the world. The collected essays portray existence at different points across India's northern frontiers and, in one instance, along borders within India. India's borders

with Bangladesh, Bhutan, Burma/Myanmar, China, and Nepal encompass radically different ways of life, a whole spectrum of relationships to the state, and many struggles with urgent identity issues. Taken together, the essays show how it is possible to comprehend Northern South Asia's various nation-state projects without relapsing into conventional nationalist accounts.

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

The guiding inspiration of this book is the attraction and distance that mark the relation between anthropology and philosophy. This theme is explored through encounters between individual anthropologists and particular regions of philosophy. Several of the most basic concepts of the

discipline—including notions of ethics, politics, temporality, self and other, and the nature of human life—are products of a dialogue, both implicit and explicit, between anthropology and philosophy. These philosophical undercurrents in anthropology also speak to the question of what it is to experience our being in a world marked by radical difference and otherness.

Vasco Da Gama's celebrated passage to India (1497–99) not only initiated a period of Christian expansion, in which Jesuit missionaries declared war to the alleged 'idolatry' of Hindus. The engagement with the until then largely unknown and unexpectedly rich culture of Hinduism

was also part of profound modern transformations that, in the long run, lead Christian Europe to recognize the plurality of religions around the globe. *Hindu–Catholic Engagements in Goa* offers a novel perspective on the Portuguese empire and Catholic hegemony in Asia that for almost half a millennium—from 1510 to 1961—had its capital in Goa. Based on fresh archival studies and extensive ethnography, it reveals the dramatic role of religion at the beginning of colonialism and modernity and provides insight into Goa's intricate Hindu-Catholic syncretism today.

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
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Study of a Gujarat Village

Water as a commodity in a consumer society is critically studied in this volume, the rural hinterland being viewed through the micro world of Mathnaa. It analyses various aspects of water management at a project in Mathnaa in

Sabarkantha district of the state of Gujarat noted for its aridity. This small village is sharply differentiated along the lines of caste, tribe, class and gender. Wells are the main source of irrigation, rainfall being erratic. Water scarcity is an arena of conflict, which leads to the social actors trying to exploit the situation for their vested interests depending on their relative power positions. The author has explained to what extent attempts to revive the institutions for community water management have been successful, illustrating local power dynamics in terms of wealth, land ownership and access to water.

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
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This volume brings together a series of essays that investigate figures, representational modes that can be read as figural, and in some instances, the limits of figurability in Indian cinema. Beloved Bapu offers readers an unprecedented insight into the relationship between Gandhi and Madeleine Slade or Mirabehn, his foremost Western woman disciple and faithful companion for twenty-three years. Gandhi and Mira were often

together but corresponded extensively when they were not. The current volume brings together this correspondence, interweaving Gandhi's letters to Mira with her own responses to him and putting them in conversation. It thereby reveals the depth and complexity of their close but fraught relationship and also provides fascinating glimpses of their perspectives, opinions and struggles with life, health, work, people and satyagraha.

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On board the *Kildonan Castle*, on his return from England to South Africa, M. K. Gandhi wrote *Hind Swarajya* in Gujarati between I3 and 22 November 1909. This centenary edition of Gandhi's *Hind Swaraj* is both a celebration of the text as

also its biography. This critical edition restores the sanctity of the 1910 first edition and brings it in conversation with the subsequent editions of 1921 and 1939. It also compares the Gujarati original with the English rendering. For the first time, this edition brings together three texts (Gujarati, Hindi and English) and also includes the original Preface and Foreword of Gandhi. This is the only bilingual edition of *Hind Swaraj*.

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# Speaking of Gandhi's Death

Translated from the Malayalam Oru Desathinte Katha, Tales of Athiranippādam is the fictionalised autobiography of S. K. Pottekkatt. Sreedharan, the protagonist, offers us a glimpse of the author's personal reality enmeshed with the unsung saga of the little corner of

the earth, Athiranippādam, where he was raised. The narrative uses an interesting mix of street gossip, fairy tale and recorded history, and filters it through a perspective that is at once involved and detached. This volume was first published in 1971 in Malayalam, and won the Sahitya Akademi Award in 1973 and the Jnanpith Award in 1980.



# Varanasi

Varanasi, in his trademark austere writing style, is M. T. Vasudevan Nair's latest novel. Non-linear and set through the protagonist's reminiscences, the novel narrates the journey of an aged man, Sudhakaran, through the city of Varanasi, and simultaneously chronicles his life through his


thoughts. As a commentary on the human condition, the novel explores the idea of lust and desire pervading through mankind, finding its essence embodied in the culture of the historic city. Translated by Sahitya Akademi Award winner, N. Gopalakrishnan, this work masterfully retains the flavour of the original Malayalam.

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This book is an account of the *phoolwalon ki sair*, or the festival of flower-sellers, its history, how it began and its observance. It is an interesting and vivid account of this annual secular celebration that in fact is still observed in Delhi.

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# Magic Web and Other Stories, The

Ashapurna Debi on the Widow and Her World

Ashapurna Debi (1909–1995) was one of the most prolific creative writers in Indian literature, known for her incisive chronicles of the Bengali middle class. She was awarded the Padmashree in 1976 and the Bharatiya Jnanpith in 1977. Translated by Jharna Sanyal, Professor of English, University of Calcutta

This is a collection of eighteen of Ashapurna Debi's short stories on the lives of widows. Through these stories, we are introduced to ritual-oriented drudges and gossip-mongering women, and to unbecoming women who refuse to hear the voice of everyday morality and silence the promptings of received values. One finds in the stories the rational, sensible, modern, urban gentleman all but merely the camouflaged victims of patriarchy.

Through the columns of Young India, Rajaji kept alive Gandhiji's message of non-violence and his emphasis on the importance

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of khaddar and the spinning wheel. Besides his various editorials and articles in Young India, the present volume also contains letters, speeches and other writings of Rajaji during these years. The volume ends with his spirited defence of the non-cooperation programme opposing council entry at the 37th Session of the Indian National Congress at Gaya in December 1922. Overall, the collection offers a close commentary on the non-cooperation movement and its aftermath.

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
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
